Umoja is a Swahili word that means unity, oneness. Grace Church Medical Mission Team of Greenville, S.C., Outspan Hospital Team of Nyeri, pastors of Laikipia West District, FOBOCK pastors, and Teleios Ministry, all under the leadership of Bernard Mwangi and Peter Wanjoi, came together to serve the medical and spiritual needs of 1,200 people in four days at Sipili Baptist Church, Sipili, Kenya.

During these four days, every person who received medical treatment also received spiritual counsel from a pastor. The end result was that 30 people made decisions to follow Jesus Christ. Pastor Michael said, "This is not a medical mission, this is a Medical Crusade."

The Grace Team, led by Mike Collins and Chuck Arnold, included Mark DeMoss, Grechen Dobbs, Julie Ellingson, Donald Spann, and Ryan Voelkert. They each brought two suitcases of medical

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## Living ~ And Learning ~ Mark 10:27

I went to Africa in December and felt the trip was something impossible that God did; with acquiescence from me.

While there I met a young man, Robert, who translated language and culture for me. In talking with him, I found that his dream is to attend school and become a leader in his community. I knew I wanted to be a part of his dream, and I felt God was calling me to guarantee Robert had the financial resources to go to school beginning this April.

I was convinced it was my mission and that God and I would, once again, do the impossible. Then the bottom line on tuition, books, room, and board came. Being an advisor at Furman University should have pre-

pared me for all of the "extras" that exist apart from tuition, but in my quest to "do the impossible" I missed the reality. I am not financially equipped to be solely responsible for Robert's education, but I had already committed to providing.

Being a slightly independent sort, OK, fiercely independent, I was confused as to why God told me to commit to this if WE couldn't do it. He reminded me that He could do it, but I had to join His team; He wasn't joining mine.

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supplies with only a backpack for their person items. The translators and the Grace Team developed very effective working relationships. By the end of the week, these relationships were obviously more than just about work. They grew into a true respect of mutual partnership in ministry.

The Medical Mission Partnership was a first of its kind for all involved. Almost every aspect of the four days of ministry was a “pioneer” experience – the length, the location, the partners involved, assignments, lodging, transportation, and more. Of course, there were times of discomfort, disagreement, correction, and adjustment, but the partners just kept working together with each obstacle overcome only strengthening the relationships and making for a more effective ministry opportunity.

The greatest difficulty for the teams was the number of people who came for treat-

ment. Each morning hundreds were there. Each evening hundreds were there. Some days as many as 500 had to be turned away with others still waiting, and that was after more than 300 had been served that day. This remains one of the lasting “difficulties” for the team. Yet, there are so many amazing stories.

She was over 80 years old and had come from more than 40 miles away. Dressed in traditional beads and cloths, this Turkana woman did not know Jesus Christ. As her son translated, Pastor Peter shared the gospel, answered her questions, and prayed with her. In just over an hour, she made a commitment to follow Jesus Christ.

Two young men, one, named Haran, about age 20 and another young man who appeared to be the same age came for treatment. After introducing ourselves to each other, I asked Haran if he had ever made a decision to follow Jesus. He answered in a strong voice, “No, but I want

to know how I can.”

As Pastor Michael and I talked with him, Pastor Peter was talking with the other young man. To our surprise we discovered that they were twins. Neither one knew the other was making a decision to follow Jesus. Both made commitments to follow Jesus Christ. When Haran left, he gave me a big handshake and said that he would tell others. Everyday after that he road his bike the three miles from his home to Sipili and stood outside the gate of the church telling others who were waiting about Jesus Christ.

Please continue to pray for those involved in this medical mission team. You, your church, or your group can be a part of a mutually beneficial partnership like the one that included this medical mission team. Join us as we join together, Umoja!, as Jesus prayed in John 17.

A few days later, I was praying that I believed in mission, I believed that God could do it, and I was willing to do whatever He wanted. So He showed me who was on this team.

I sent an e-mail to a few people, some of whom I am very close to and some of whom I am merely an acquaintance of, but all by His grace. It was amazing to see the response from these people. One e-mailed to say she had helped with education of an African student in the past and she “would love” to help educate Robert, too.

Another called to say that her family was planning a gift and looking for direction on where to give it; Robert’s tuition was her answer. Yet another sent me an e-mail and said that she had a specific amount that day, and more on the way. In less than a week God had provided the exact amount needed to send Robert to school!

I was ecstatic ... And then his e-mail came. I had e-mailed Robert to see how he was doing working in the refugee camps, but he had not responded. On the day I found out we would have the money, he e-mailed to say he was excited because his pastor told him that his schooling was going to be paid for but he was concerned that he didn’t have a computer. He remembered that I offered to help him so he was writing to ask me if it was possible to help purchase a computer.

I was heartsick because I didn’t have any money left for a computer that he obviously needed and he had, not knowing that I had already given all I could, stepped out in faith to ask for my help.

That night one of my favorite people called and said she hadn’t returned my e-mail, but she had some money for Robert’s education.

Her gift ensured that a computer could be given. God provided every penny needed

to send Robert to school fully equipped!

After I danced around my house for a few minutes, God reminded me of Mark 10:27. I know the NIV version but felt led to read The Message version. I read it and laughed out loud. “*Jesus was blunt: ‘No chance at all if you think you can pull it off by yourself. Every chance in the world if you let God do it.’*” I say “not a chance” all the time, and there it was, Jesus saying it to me.

I know without a doubt that God is doing great things through Robert. Robert has been instrumental in helping relocate, soothe, and assist Kikuyu people who have been displaced due to the violence Kenya experienced earlier this year.

I am so excited by his potential and so grateful that God allowed me to join his team on this mission. For those of you on this mission with me, he’ll be graduating soon; maybe we should all go see him throw his cap...

Elizabeth started a women's meeting with the mothers. On May 8, we had a special meeting as we celebrated Mother's Day. Eight mothers and two grandmothers came to this celebration. We had 31 people in our home with for this event. The motto was from Psalm 127:3. So that meeting was a new opportunity for testimony and to build relations with the mothers.

Fülöp Dalma helped the children make special cards (hand work) for the mothers, and the children were greeting their moms with the Bible verses and some songs.

## Reflections From the Green Chair.....

*Addition to last edition's Green Chair – add the Scripture: "Love your neighbor as yourself."*

More and more, I am reflecting upon the practical realities of following Jesus. They may be theological in nature, but mostly they are about what this means for me when I get up tomorrow and follow Jesus.

Recently, I was struck by the profound reality that I have found my cross. In fact, I have been taking it up for quite some time. I cannot tell you the relief I have found in having that knowledge. Also, I cannot tell you the profound responsibility it has brought to my life.

Jesus said, "If anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself, and take up his cross and follow Me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it; but whoever loses his life for My sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" What does this really mean for us as the church, as followers of Jesus?

All my life, I have heard people refer to "the cross I have to bear." Usually, it relates to something that is difficult or painful circumstance or situation; but,

really it is a part of everyday life. For example, when my parents came to live in Greenville, I could have said as some have that taking a more active role in my parents' care was "the cross I have to bear." A lost job, plant closing, or financial difficulty may lead someone to say, "That's the cross I have to bear."

The simple truth is that is not "the cross to be born." We can endure and come out of these difficulties stronger in faith and deeper in life because of the cross, but they are not our cross to take up.

The cross is something that we have a clear choice to make. A cross is not an accident or a passing situation or circumstance. The cross is something we see and know. The cross is something we understand and with that clear understanding say, "YES." Bearing the cross or taking up the cross is not brought about by some circumstance in life but by a conscious choice to follow Jesus regardless of circumstance or situation.

We can see the cross coming. Look at Jesus just before the passage quoted above. He told the disciples in detail what was going to happen. Gethsemane was not the first time that Jesus prayed, "Not my will but your will be done in

life," or "Not my needs but your will be done." Taking up the cross means that we will pray that prayer a lot.

Several things are involved in taking up the cross.

1. Our cross is always for the benefit of others' relationship with God in Jesus.
2. The cross always costs the one taking it up—in short the cross causes us to say, "God is there another way of doing this that is not so painful or costly."
3. The cross is understood clearly in terms of what God is doing in this world to redeem it.
4. As painful, difficult or costly as the cross may be, we always can see life on the other side. The cross is a means and not an end (*Hebrews 12*). The cross is not an end of life but a way to life.
5. Sometimes the responsibility and cost seem overwhelming; but we are not in despair or overwhelmed by it. In fact, sometimes our lives are just plain joyful.

One day, after our cross is finished; we will enjoy the fullness of a life that has been found and really lived everyday following Jesus.
